Personalised Stamps: How collectable are these?



Australia Post has at last announced the issue of personalised stamps - as distinct from the previous option which was a personalised tab attached to a basic stamp. Someone recently asked if these were collectable to which the answer is, "Of course they are. Anything that offers variation is collectable. Whether you choose to try to form a collection of these is a personal choice. Whether a catalogue of these will ever be available and whether they will be acceptable for international exhibitions may be questions with different answers.

One wonders why Australia Post took so long to do this. Other countries, such as New Zealand and Austria have



been doing it for years and at a time when post offices are struggling to remain profitable, it seems logical to pursue any opportunity for raising revenue. Personalised stamps should be far more profitable than most of the merchandise currently available at your local post office as they can be produced cheaply and are sold at almost double the rate of normal stamps. A sheet of 20 costs \$35 but this should be no impediment to those wishing to use them, for instance to show off new baby photos or send wedding invitations. International stamps are also available)

Perhaps the main drawback for collectors will be that, unlike many of the overseas examples, these resemble a sticky label rather than a stamp. (Remember how banana shaped stamps were initially derided?) They appear to be only peel and stick and come in a rather strange variety of shapes but a simple oblong is not an option.

Despite the objections that some people might have, these will undoubtedly be popular. Perhaps we could produce one for our 90th birthday.

At the moment, for obvious reasons, the images have to be approved and the advertising only mentions personal use. They do not say if commercial

varieties will be allowed but it would be surprising if they are not so keep your eyes open for the next Coke or MacDonalds issues.


Thematic collecting: Ships on which my Grandfather sailed.

In the last Newsletter the topic of Thematic Collecting was discussed.

I am interested in ships on which my Grandfather was employed. I recently discovered a stamp issued by Fiji in 1980. The stamp features the **Levuka** a Steam Ship, which my Grandfather worked on as a Steward during 1925.

The LEVUKA was a 6129 gross tons, 400' Twin screw passenger vessel built by A Stephens & Sons, Glasgow for Australasian United Steam Navigation Company Ltd. She traded to the Pacific islands especially Fiji. She was sold to Lloyd Brasileiro, South America in July 1926 (the year after my Grandfather sailed on her) and was renamed Pedro II and then Dom Pedro II in 1935. She was scrapped at Rio de Janeiro in 1958.



My Grandfather was born in England and during WWI was in the Royal Garrison Artillery. He first departed the Port of Plymouth England in 1919 on the Ex - German Steamer Ship the Adolph Woermann under the control of the Aberdeen White Star Line. She travelled via Panama Canal, returning WWI Troops home to Australia and New Zealand.

He was also on a number of other ships, the last record I have of him is travelling to New York in 1939 aboard the Scythia. (Which, I am looking out for also).

What's your favourite stamp?

This month we are inviting members to let others know which stamp in their collection is their favourite. Once again we will begin with the editor's favourite, which is difficult because there are several, but to get the ball rolling we will start with the Australian Imperial Forces issue from July 1940. This set was the only issue for 1940 and there were none in 1939 which seems astounding these days.

The stamp was engraved by Frank Manley who featured in our November 2019 newsletter. Apart from being a wonderful example of the engraver's art, the stamp also has a fascinating story which we told a few years back but is worth repeating. This stamp shows that his skill was equal to any engraver of his time or since. His talent was only restricted by the abilities of the printing presses of his time. The detail in the background of this stamp is astonishing and shows scenes from the city and the bush, the twin sources of AIF fighters and I have blown the image up to A3 size and the details are still clear. When you think that Manley had to engrave this on a steel block with a small chisel called a burin, engraving it life size and in reverse, the skill required is staggering.





The stamp was based on a painting for the Australian Women's Weekly by Virgil Reilly. He was a well-known cartoonist as well as painting magazine covers and illustrating books. The people in Virgil Reilly's picture are known, and they are his eldest son, Gavin Reilly (soldier), Charles Bruce (sailor), Arthur Wright (airman) and the nurse was Virgil Reilly's wife. Manley substituted post office workers for the original models, who were actual servicemen as it was felt that if any of them were killed, it would be too hard on their families to see them constantly portrayed on a stamp.

This proved prophetic as the three men on the original painting, including Reilly's son, were killed in the war. The airman, Arthur Norman Wright is often confused in the reports with his squadron leader, Arthur Norman Hicks who died of injuries received in an aircraft accident in England in June 1941. One report I read was that Wright's plane was shot down but I have not been able to verify this. Leading Seaman Charles Henry Bruce was a gunlayer on the British transport, *Ceramic*, sunk in the Atlantic in December, 1940. Third man was Virgil Reilly's eldest son, Gavan, who was killed in ambush near Buna Mission, Papua, in December, 1941. The model for the soldier on the stamp has been identified as another engraver who worked with Manley, R. J. Becker.
