Dahomey Woman

Dahomey (which changed its name to Benin in 1975) was a French colony when this stamp was issued. If you think that the woman depicted has a "Don't mess with me" look about her, then you might be right.


The model for this stamp was a woman from the Fon tribe, the fiercest in a militaristic country known as the Black Sparta. Their warriors terrorised all their neighbours.

The Smithsonian Institute documents a display given to Francesco Borghero, a missionary where 3000 troops stormed a quarter-mile long barricade made of Acacia logs which sported hundreds of two inch thorns. Despite the thorns inflicting savage wounds, the warriors showed no fear or pain while reaching their objective, actually crossing the barricade twice.

Every one of the 3000 troops, right up to the general in command, was a woman. They were known as the Mino or Black Amazons, a female only regiment, some of whom wielded two-handed, metre long razor sharp swords that were said to be capable of cutting a man in half.

Certainly not a woman to be messed with!

The stamp was designed and engraved by Pierre Gandon and issued for Dahomey, French West Africa in 1941





Favourite Stamps

We all collect different stamps whether it be a particular country, thematic or even variations on a single stamp. The variety available to us is one of the things that keeps the hobby fresh and interesting. Those outside the hobby, who might think that all we do is stick little pictures in albums, have no idea what they are missing.

No matter what our collecting interests, there is one item that all stamp collectors would like to own. It is the Penny Black, the original, number one that started it all and apart from its obvious historical value, it is a thing of some beauty with quite a story behind it.

We have told in a previous issue how Rowland Hill transformed the British postal service but there are a few things you may not know about this stamp.

Although a competition had been held for the design, in the end it was passed to William Wyon R.A. His design was based on a medal he had previously designed and his original intention was for an embossed stamp.



This idea was rejected but used a year later for prepaid envelopes. Wyon used the medal as his model for the stamp. Charles Heath was given the job of engraving the first stamp but, not trusting his eyesight which was failing with age, he gave the work to his son Frederick, under his supervision.

The printing was done by Perkins, Bacon and Petch. Jacob Perkins, an American, had brought the rights to England for an engraving machine which did scrollwork on banknotes and this was used for the background behind the Queen's head. This was considered difficult to reproduce by hand, thus making forgery harder.

Although the government committee favoured the cheaper typography method of printing, Perkins argued that only recess printing offered the quality that Her Majesty deserved and his argument carried the day. Few people realise that the first British stamp was printed by an American or that he had such an influence on the final stamp.

In 1852 after the death of Henry Petch, the firm became Perkins Bacon and Co. The stamp was originally postmarked with black ink but as this was difficult to see on a black stamp and also because it appeared that the ink used could be washed off, making the stamp re-usable, the postmark was changed to red ink. Later, these colours were reversed and the stamp was then printed in red and the postmark went back to black.
