

POSTMARKS & POSTAL HISTORY OF WARRNAMBOOL

By: William. H. EWERS (1984 edition)

This is a plain blue covered book, that could prove invaluable reading for anyone interested in the Victorian, West Coast postal history. The postal history of Warrnambool is typical of many Victorian country towns where a vast variety of material is still available for anyone interested in studying postal markings and cancellations.

It is obvious William Ewers has spent many hours researching the book, he has searched Auction catalogues, local history, colleagues from the Warrnambool Philatelic Society and contacted stamp dealers. William has also searched for articles and books looking for any relevant information.

William acknowledges that this work is incomplete. "New material will turn up as people clear out old correspondence and sort through material from deceased estates. Old envelopes are of historical interest and should not be destroyed until they have been examined by an expert."

The first Warrnambool Post Office was opened in 1849, Portland in 1841 and Geelong 1842. The first Warrnambool post office building was constructed in Timor Street during the year 1856. This book contains many facts and information on the beginnings of freight services and the postal history that took place on the Victorian West coast.

The chapters on the Postmarks of Warrnambool, contains twenty-five chapters and covers the areas of Barred Numerals, Machine Cancellations, Money Order's, Shipping mail & First Day Issues.



Why are these people on stamps No 17: Walter Parker, Alex Campbell, Roy Longmore

By the time you receive this month's newsletter, ANZAC Day will be almost upon us so it seems fitting to discuss the people honoured on the Australia Day "Australian Legends" issue from 2000.

Anzac Day is a national day of remembrance in Australia and New Zealand that broadly commemorates all Australians and New Zealanders "who served and died in all wars, conflicts, and peacekeeping operations" and "the contribution and suffering of all those who have served". The date commemorates the first landing of Australian and New Zealand forces at Gallipoli on the 25th. April, 1916. This followed the failure of the allied fleet to force its way through the Dardanelles earlier that year.

By 2000, only the three men depicted on the stamps remained alive as witnesses to the disaster that was Gallipoli with Walter Campbell being the last to die aged 103. He lied about his age when enlisting and at the time, was only sixteen. He was nicknamed "The Kid" by the other soldiers. He observed that there was nothing really extraordinary in being the last; rather, he pointed out the simple fact that he had been one of the youngest at Gallipoli. Shortly before his death, Campbell stated that "For god's sake, don't glorify Gallipoli - it was a terrible fiasco, a total failure and best forgotten".

Walter Parker's pre-war plans for a career in Sydney as a commercial art printer were set aside when he enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force (AIF) at age 20. Parker who

initially thought he was being sent to England arrived at the Battle of Gallipoli in November 1915 with the 20th Battalion, 4th Reinforcements. He was tasked with carrying ammunition and water through the trenches to the front. After his evacuation from Turkey, he fought in France. He was shot in the arm at Pozières; and then he was invalided to England.

Roy Longmore, a farm-hand in Geelong, Victoria, enlisted at age 21 on 13 July 1915. After training in Egypt, he was sent to Gallipoli where he was a sapper with the 2nd Division, burrowing underneath the Turkish positions and laying mines. After evacuation from Turkey, he fought at Pozières, Armentières, and Villers-Bretonneux. He was wounded three times in France and was momentarily given up for dead when he was shot as the Armistice approached in November 1918. He later recalled,

"We were patrolling in a gully when suddenly half a dozen Germans appeared over a hill armed with machine guns and opened fire. Jerry riddled me, knocking me flat on my back, and the last I heard was 'Longy's had it, they got him."

Fortunately, his fellow soldiers saw him move and rescued him and he returned to Australia on 16 March 1919 as a member of the 2nd Pioneer Battalion.
